

An Italian Journey with Alessio Boschi

"What matters in art is not thinking but making". Jewellery is an art form and the Italian jeweller Alessio Boschi has taken very seriously these words from the German writer and statesman, Johann Wolfgang von Goethe.

Alessio Boschi has made a remarkable collection of jewellery devoted to Italian architecture, taking in Venice, Florence and Verona, Pisa, Lucca and Rome. Through his craft, Alessio Boschi pays mibute to Italian magnificence—eight creations, cight wonders, a bejewelled journey through Italy, its history and its fascinating, monumental architecture.

Romanticism and nostalgia combine in Boschi's jewellery to create a palpable allure. He uses modern and intricate techniques which sometimes permit the jewel to be multifunctional, creating a crescendo of secret surprises.

Starting in Venice, Alessio takes inspiration from the iconic gondolas that navigate the Venetian canals, and also from the Bridge of Sighs, which connects the prison to the interrogation rooms of the Doge Palace, passing over the Rio di Palazzo. As Lord Byron said, this was the place where the condemmed people could see their last ray of lights and take the last breath of fresh air before going to prison, but if a couple passed under the bridge with a gendola and kissed, that means eternal love.

So, the Italian jeweller, carving white gold to represent candid marble, recreated faithfully the Bridge of Sighs, cercusting diamonds in all details and adding on its op an astonishing volet un-heated pinel. The real surprise comes when you open the ring and find three little figurines sculpted in different coloured gold, depicting the scene of two lovers bidding each other farewell. The man goes into prison accompanied by a guard armed with a



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After unlocking the safety system this micro-sculpture splits into two halves with an engraved and powerful message "Trust You, Never Fall" written in a medieval font. The bottom of the ring features the complex coat of arms of the four Marine Republics (Venice, Pisa, Amalfi and Genova) and underneath lies behind them a reproduction of the Pisa coin, with the words "Populi Pisani" and two little carved arches, each with a leading tower, all in pink gold.

Finally, all roads lead to Rome, where Alessio's journey concludes for this year with a tribute to the Colosseum, the most iconic Italian monument. Via two exquisite rings, the Roman jeweller looks at this architectural masterpiece in two perspectives: The Colosseum when it was constructed between 70 and 80AD, and the Colosseum today. In pink or white gold, the two rings depict majestically the Colosseum in a labyrinth of intricate details, such as the she-wolf with the child twins Romulus and Remus or the astonishing padparadcha sapphire that centres a rose gold miniature of a colosseum engraved in pink gold, in which we find two micro figures of a gladiator facing a tiger in a 6mm proportions. The micro-amphitheatre can also be worn as a small chain necklace with a delicate rose gold chain passing through the arches.



The Colosseum nowadays ring features a reproduction of the northern wall with three levels of semi-pilasters set at the base of each level in lines of diamond pavé, crowned by custom-cut black diamonds. The two upper levels are then decorated with a micro-reproduction of some of the mythical statues that adorned the building during the Empire period. In alignment on the inner side of the Colosseum the inclined surfaces alternate princess-cut emeralds and lines of baguette diamonds, giving the impression of descending rows and seats.

The southern part of the Colosseum is embellished with micro-diamonds leaving visible the details of the arcades and the internal vomitoria (caves) from which two wild beasts burst forth, connected with chains. The arena is occupied by a large oval morganite that is reminscent of the warm colour of the bricks and stones underneath the marble. The final surprise of the Colosseum ring is the curved aerodynamic flanks, set with champagne diamonds and depicting the engraved Latin sentence, "Quamdiu stat colisaeus, stat et Roma; quando cadet colisaeus, cadet et Roma; quando cadet Roma, cadet et mundus" (As long as the Colosseum stands, so shall Rome, when the Colossus falls, Rome shall fall; when Rome falls, so falls the world).

The two gallery's springs are carved on one side with the SPQR abbreviation for Senatus Populusque Romanus (the Senate and people of Rome) while on the opposite side a legionnaire's helmet and the crossed spears pay homage to the Roman's prowess in combat.

Alessio's journey through jewellery not only allows the wearer to enjoy the utmost artistry but also to behold the inner beauty of Italy, it's secrets and its incredible architecture.
